January 20 at 7PM


On the third Thursday of every month at 7PM in the lower chapel, we will be offering a Holy Hour for the Sanctification of Priests. This is something recommended by the Congregation of the Clergy and, in this our day and age, sorely needed. This secular age of ours presents some unique challenges to the Church and to Her ministerial priesthood. The current priest shortage adds to the stress that many priests feel and can be a challenge to their spiritual life and pastoral service. Thursday of Holy Week our Lord instituted the Holy Eucharist and priesthood, it is an ideal day to pray for priests before the Blessed Sacrament. The Holy Hour will consist of: adoration; the rosary; litany and prayer of petitions; silent prayer and benediction. "During that month I met with many holy Priests, and yet I saw that even though the sublime dignity of Priesthood raises them higher than the Angels, they are still but weak and imperfect men. If holy Priests, whom Our Lord in the Gospel calls the salt of the earth, have need of our prayers, how much more the struggling and the lukewarm?"

# St. John's Safe Environment Request (CORI Clearance)

The Archdiocese of Boston requires that all staff and volunteers complete a CORI (criminal record check) form **each year**. This form applies to all volunteers 18 years of age and older ministering to children, youth, elderly, and the disabled serving within various ministries. The requirement is that each individual completing the CORI request form come to the parish office or parish hall to have their CORI Request **form verified in person** with a government issued picture ID. ## CROSS ROADS

Nehemiah 8: 2-6, 8-10; Psalm 19: 8-10, 15; 1 Corinthians 12: 12-30; Luke 1: 1-4; 4: 14-21

Today is the Third Sunday in Ordinary Time. Back in 2019 Pope Francis dedicated the third Sunday in Ordinary time to "the celebration, study, and dissemination of the word of God." Also, he encourages us to make it part of our life "to grow in our knowledge and love of the Scriptures and the risen Lord, who continues to speak his word and to break bread in the community of believers." Also, we are encouraged to "strengthen our bonds with the Jewish people and to pray for Christian unity." In other words, growing in our knowledge of the scriptures is to be a way of life that strengthens us and gives us joy that is eternal. It is good that we listen attentively to homilies that the word might feed us spiritually. But just as we learned to feed ourselves as adult human beings, we have a responsibility to feed ourselves spiritually by studying the Scriptures, particularly the Gospels.

In today's first reading, and in today's gospel we see two contrasting and complementary proclamations of Holy Scripture. In the first reading Ezra proclaims the law to about 5000 Jews who had remained faithful during the Babylonian captivity and were freed to return to Jerusalem. Ezra read aloud "from daybreak till midday." The people wept but were encouraged to rejoice in the word of the law. About four hundred years later we see Jesus in today's gospel, not long after his baptism and anointing by the Holy Spirit, proclaiming the word in the synagogue of his hometown of Nazareth. Jesus not only proclaimed the word, but he proclaimed himself to be the fulfillment of the scripture passage that he had read aloud, the anointed one of God, to be the Word itself made flesh. How would the people of Nazareth respond? Not well, as we shall see next week.

Study the Scriptures and rejoice in the word of God. As the many parts (the living stones) of the same Mystical Body of Christ (the Church which is the new Jerusalem), we each have a role to bring the word to each other and to the world, to bring glad tidings to the poor, to free those who are oppressed, to bring liberty to captives, freedom to the oppressed; and to respect and protect the sanctity of human life from conception to natural death. For each of us to do our part it is necessary to know, to contemplate, to pray and to live the word of God.
