Many years ago, I was told a story by Judie Brown of American Life League about the day her daughter told her she was pregnant. Judie told us the first words out of every parent's mouth should be, "I love you." I learned this lesson when my daughter was still a baby herself and never really imagined I would have to put this into practice with her. Nineteen years later that is exactly what I had to do, and I thank God for those wise words Judie taught me so many years ago. When my daughter told me she was pregnant I was filled with joy knowing that I was now a grandfather. The following week I drove her to our local pregnancy resource center, where I was recognized immediately for my pro-life work. We were loved, welcomed and never once judged in the least. The day after Christmas I met my daughter at the doctor's office where we found out she was having a little girl. That little girl is now five years old. While I have spent 35 years calling for an end to child killing, I know I must also call for us to show love and mercy to all and teach the world how to embrace the gift of life and reject the lies that lead so many to abortion.

CROSS ROADS

By Deacon Tony

1 Kings 17: 10-16; Psalm 146: 7-10; Hebrews 9: 24-28; Mark 12: 38-44

Today's readings emphasize the importance of having firm faith and trust in the LORD OUR GOD; because we are not in charge of the events that can challenge our confidence and even our lives. Such things can cause anxiety and fear, but they need not. Two widowed women: the widow in Zarephath (in the first reading) and the widow donating a couple of pennies into the treasury (in today's Gospel, who Jesus took note of), were generous, even in their own poverty and need. They demonstrated an attitude of sacrificial love, doing good works for others to glorify God, with undaunted faith and trust in Him.

The first woman was asked to bring food and water to Elijah, even though she had very little oil and flour left, and was about to make what she thought would be the last meal for herself and her son. Elijah told her not to be afraid because the Lord promised that her jar of flour and her jar of oil would not run dry. She trusted in the Lord, tended to Elijah, and she was able to feed herself and her son for a year. The widow in today's gospel similarly had little to give, but what she gave was all she had to live on. However worried or anxious each might have been, their trust and faith in the Lord overcame those feelings.

By contrast, in today's gospel Jesus warned against the scribes. Whatever the scribes donated was from their excess. They cherished their distinctive flowing robes, their places of honor, their power, position, and perceived "legacy" (a word that is used all too often these days). Whatever good they did was for show, to be noticed, to be honored and revered by other men. Yet God Himself became poor for us in the person of Jesus Christ. We are not in control of unexpected events. The Lord is just and provides us with what we need. The Lord gives us courage, consoles and raises us when we are burdened. We need only to do our best to do good works and be generous for the right reasons, with humility, for the glory of God. One need not be anxious about the results or the aftermath. When we give ourselves and our good works over to the Lord (who IS the one in charge) in faith and trust, we need not be anxious, worried, or afraid. Lesson: "Let go and let God." As for legacy (the esteem of other humans), it is futile. The only true legacy is what the Lord sees in us when we pass, because it is the only legacy that counts and lasts forever!


