LITURGICAL NOTES FOR HOLY WEEK Holy Thursday: General Notes

The Mass is, first of all, the memorial of the institution of the Most Holy Eucharist, that is, of the memorial of the Lord's Passover, by which under sacramental signs He perpetuated among us by the sacrifice of the New Covenant. The Mass of the Lord's Supper is also the memorial of the institution of the priesthood, by which Christ's mission and sacrifice are perpetuated in the world. The tabernacle is empty before the liturgy begins. With the ending of Mass, a Eucharistic procession, in which the whole congregation is invited to join, will proceed to the lower chapel and the altar of reposition. The faithful are encouraged to spend some time in adoration. Holy Thursday will conclude liturgically with compline, which will take place at 10PM.

Good Friday

The holy water fonts are emptied. The altar is completely bare: without a cross, without candles and without cloths. This is the only day in the entire calendar year when Mass is not celebrated anywhere in the Catholic World.

The Easter Vigil

The Easter Vigil takes place after night fall and is composed of four parts: the Liturgy of the Light; the Liturgy of the Word; the renewal of baptismal vows and the baptism and confirmation of the catechumens; and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Divine Mercy Sunday

The Sunday in the octave of Easter is Mercy Sunday established by Pope John Paul II, on April 30, in the Jubilee Year of 2000, and is to be observed by the universal Church. The schedule for Mercy Sunday, **Sunday, April 27, 2025**, in the afternoon at St. John's will be as follows:

1:30 PM Exposition of the Blessed Sacrament followed by the rosary.

2:00 PM Confessions will be heard.

2:30 PM Readings from the diary of St. Faustina will be proclaimed.

3:00 PM The Divine Mercy Chaplet will be chanted.

3:30 PM Benediction and Final Blessing.

The Divine Mercy Novena begins on Good Friday, THIS Friday, April 18.

CROSS ROADS By Deacon Tony

Luke 19:28-40/ Isaiah 50:4-7/ Psalm 22:8-9, 17-20, 23-24/ Philippians 2:6-11/ Luke 22:14—23:56

It is Palm Sunday, otherwise known as Passion Sunday. Once again, we come face to face with the love of God who sent His only begotten Son to bring forgiveness and salvation to humanity. Christ enters Jerusalem riding on a colt; and He was greeted by a throng of people, who were blessing and praising Him: "Hosanna in the highest and blessed is He who comes in the name of the Lord." This scene is symbolic of, and a proclamation of the kingship of Christ. But Jesus knew how it would end. He was all too familiar with the weak and fickle nature of humanity. But Jesus loved these people, even as He knew that they would turn on Him and demand His crucifixion. Jesus the Christ, the Anointed One, the Word of God Made Flesh, would remain humbly and steadfastly committed to His mission of salvation. He would submit himself lovingly to death on a cross.

His sacrifice would be the fulfillment of Isaiah's prophecy regarding the suffering servant: He would not turn back, not shield Himself from the torture, and He would endure the spitting, the mockery, and the pain. Jesus trusted the love of His Father: "The Lord is my help, therefore I am not disgraced." (Isaiah). He would endure Judas' betrayal, abandonment by his disciples, and Peter's denials. He humbly and obediently emptied Himself for our sake. Jesus, the timeless Word of God, carried the weight of all the sins of humanity, past present and future. All were in His mind and His Sacred Heart as He suffered and died.

In a sense, because He was mindful of all of us, we were there with Him. He was aware of our sinfulness. And when we sin or ignore his promptings, His will, and His ways, we too abandon and deny Him. But though He was aware of all this, as with His apostles, Christ also saw our potential. As we begin Holy Week, let us strive to be more aware of Christ, as He is of us. Let us trust the love of God, and give our weaknesses, suffering, and love to Him who IS love. Let us spend time prayerfully looking at and gratefully contemplating the marred, Most Holy, and Loving Face of Christ Crucified. He WILL comfort us, and in His timeless life and kingship, we will please and comfort Him as we join our trials and suffering with His.







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
