Our Lady of Mt. Carmel and the Brown Scapular

July 16th is the memorial of Our Lady of Mt. Carmel (Carmel in Hebrew means "Garden of God"). This feast day is dated through pious tradition as the day in the 13th century, that Our Lady of Mt. Carmel gave the brown scapular to St. Simon Stock, a Carmelite priest serving in England. St. Simon was exhorted by Our Lady to make available this scapular to the faithful.

Our Lady of Mt. Carmel will extend her patronage to the faithful who wear the scapular, especially at one's hour of death. The faithful in turn pledge:

- --Devotion to Our Lady and the teachings of the Church,
- --To live a chaste life according to one's station in life
- --And to say the rosary daily or
- --Recite daily the Little Office of the BVM.
- --Observe the fasts of Church with abstinence
- from meat on Fridays.

One must be vested by a priest or deacon with the accompanying prayers.

For those interested, the vesting of the brown scapular of the Carmelites will be available after the Masses **THIS weekend**. For those that currently wear the scapular, one's vesture could be renewed.

O my God, in union with the Immaculate Heart of Mary (here kiss the scapular as a sign of your consecration), I offer Thee the Precious Blood of Jesus from all the altars throughout the world, joining with It the offering of my every thought, word and action of this day. O my Jesus, I desire to gain every indulgence and merit I can, and I offer them together with myself, to Mary Immaculate, that She may best apply them to the interests of Thy most Sacred Heart. O Precious Blood of Jesus, save us! O Immaculate Heart of Mary, pray for us! O Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on us!

"A new genetic testing service now enables parents using in vitro fertilization (IVF) to rank embryos based on their predicted lifespan and disease risk. For \$6,000, Nucleus Genomics offers to analyze up to 900 conditions, including cancer, heart disease, and even IQ and height. While framed as a scientific advance, this practice marks a disturbing shift: human lives reduced to data, with embryos discarded for not meeting projected standards.

CROSS ROADS By Deacon Tony Genesis 18:1-10; Psalm15:2-5; Colossians 1:24-28; Luke 10:38-42

Hospitality is a wonderful thing. It is demonstrated by Abraham, "A just and upright man, and by Martha and Mary in today's gospel from Luke. As for Abraham and his wife Sarah, they were hospitable to three men who were seemingly on a journey (likely two angels and God Himself). What does it mean to say that Abraham was a just and upright man. Today's psalm says something about that. To be upright, among other things, one must be blameless, one who thinks and holds the truth in his heart. one who does not slander or harm his fellow man, and one who honors those who fear the Lord. Abraham met those criteria, and was generous and gracious to his visitors, and open to the will of the Lord. Abraham and his wife were childless. His reward for his hospitality was the promise that his wife Sarah would, in a year, at the age of 90, bear a son.

Saint Paul in his letter to the Colossians also was open to the will of God as he reioiced in his suffering in his mission to obey Christ's order to the apostles to make disciples of all people. Part of today's reading from Colossians speaks of Paul's suffering as "filling up what is lacking in the afflictions of Christ." But Paul was not implying that the sufferings of Christ were deficient. Some scholars suggest that Paul was merely joining his sufferings with those of Christ for the sake of the mystical body of Christ (the Church), something we all are called to do, and that he foresaw the trials, afflictions, and tribulations that would precede the end times. Others suggest that Paul's mystical relationship with Christ allowed him to join his sufferings with those of Christ, and in so doing, allowed him to call his own sufferings part of the afflictions of Christ. By no means are Christ's sufferings lacking in anything.

In Luke's gospel Mary and Martha are hosting Jesus. Mary focused on Jesus, sat at his feet and listened. She was open to Christ and his message. Martha was busy preparing and serving. That does not mean Martha was not listening. But as Jesus said, Martha was anxious and worried about many things. Worry and anxiety are not sinful, but they can be obstacles to learning and being open to receiving the Lord's message. In this scene Jesus speaks of only one thing as necessary for us who follow him: being open to receive the message and the person of Jesus and being receptive to the mystery of Christ as he comes to us through one another.







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
